- County Engineer responded to the Borough's request to extend the righthand turning lane from Closter Dock Road to Route 9W. They will need engineering plans from the Borough to address drainage. The County is amenable to entering into a shared services agreement where the cost of construction plans, including any necessary survey work and permitting would be the responsibility of the Borough and the County will be responsible for the construction costs.

5. Resolution #082:3'3019:Oppose Vegetative Management Response Act (\$2505/A2558)
OFFERED BY: Councilwoman Frankel SECONDED BY: Councilwoman Gerstein

At this regular meeting of the Mayor and Council Borough of Alpine, County of Bergen, State of New Jersey held on Wednesday, March 27, 2019.

**WHEREAS**, there is presently pending before the New Jersey Senate and Assembly the proposed Vegetative Management Response Act (\$2505/A2558); and

WHEREAS, said legislation would allow any public utility to unilaterally usurp the role of local government in the management of public trees within public parks and within the public right-of-way, and would unilaterally permit the removal of trees on private property without the owner's consent whenever the public utility determines that such trees are "growing in, near, or adjacent to the electric utility's right-of-way, and the electric distribution and transmission system...which may fall into, touch, affect, or otherwise interfere with an electrical distribution line;" and

WHEREAS, proposed amendments to N.J.S.A. 40:64-12.c would expand the purview of any public utility (such as electric, gas, water and pipeline) or cable television company to clear, remove, cut, or destroy any tree, shrub, or plant, without municipal permission or consultation, if done to install or maintain any structures or fixtures; and

**WHEREAS**, the proposed legislation exempts public utilities from local regulation or penalty if they claim to be "acting in good faith, with due diligence and reasonable judgement;" and

WHEREAS, under the proposed legislation, a utility is under no obligation to confer with the local government or the private property owner before unilaterally choosing to clear, move, cut or destroy the vegetation; and

WHEREAS, the proposed legislation limits the authority of local shade tree commissions by granting authority to any public utility to carry out "vegetative management" without notifying or consulting with the municipality or taking municipal regulations into account; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Alpine values both its public and private trees, which not only add to the beauty and overall livability of the Borough, but also serve as a buffer to the extremes of weather, offer cooling shade in the summer and shelter from winter winds, produce oxygen and reduce carbon dioxide in the air and help to curtail flooding and restore the groundwater supply; and

WHEREAS, the proposed legislation is imbalanced and dramatically expands the authority of electric and other public utilities; and

**WHEREAS**, the Borough Council finds that public utilities and cable television providers have an obligation and responsibility to work with local authorities to cooperate in the responsible management of trees;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Alpine, Bergen County, New Jersey that the Borough of Alpine opposes the Vegetative Management Response Act in its present form and urges the New Jersey Senate and Assembly not to adopt same; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Borough Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to provide a copy of the within resolution to State Senator Loretta Weinberg, Assemblyman Gordon Johnson and Assemblywoman Valerie Vainieri Huttle and to the municipal clerks within Bergen County.

## BOROUGH OF ALPINE ORDINANCE NO. 781

# AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CERTAIN BOROUGH ORDINANCES AND INCREASE FEES UNDER THE BUILDING AND ZONING DEPARTMENTS RELEVANT TO CHAPTERS 97 UCC, 103 DRIVEWAYS, 111 FENCES, 177 SIGNS

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Alpine based upon the recommendation of the Building Department have determined that there is a need to increase fees and update certain ordinances in compliance with state statute:

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED,** by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Alpine, Bergen County, New Jersey to amend the following sections or portions thereof as follows:

#### Section 1

#### Section § 97-4. Fees.

- A. Construction permit fee, sum of subcode fees. The fee for construction permit shall be the sum of the subcode fees and shall be paid before the permit is issued.
- (1) Building Subcode Fee:

The building subcode fee shall be:

- (a) For new construction: **\$0.10** per cubic foot of building or structure volume provided that the minimum residential fee shall be \$300 and the minimum commercial fee shall be \$500.
- (b) For renovations, alterations, and repairs:
  - [1] Residential: **\$40** per \$1,000 of estimated cost of the work provided that the minimum Residential fee shall be **\$100**.
  - [2] Commercial: **\$60** per \$1,000 of estimated cost of the work provided that the minimum Commercial fee shall be \$200.
- (c) For additions: \$0.10 per cubic foot of building or structure volume for the added portion provided that the minimum residential fee shall be \$300 and the minimum commercial fee shall be \$500.
- (d) For combinations of renovations and additions: the sum of the fees computed separately as renovations and additions.
- (e) For construction of swimming pool, hot tub, spa, water feature, outdoor kitchens, outdoor fireplace, and any other recreational facility or any other appurtenant structure:
  - [1] Residential: **\$40** per \$1,000 of the estimated cost of such structure and appurtenances provided that the minimum Residential fee shall be **\$100**.
  - [2] Commercial: **\$60** per \$1,000 of estimated cost of the work provided that the minimum Commercial fee shall be \$200.
- (f) For the construction of Large Open Volume Buildings / Structures:\$0.095 per cubic foot of the building or structure provided that the minimum fee is \$200.
- (2) Plumbing / Mechanical Subcode Fee:

The plumbing subcode fee shall be:

- (a) \$40 per plumbing fixture or device to be installed provided that the minimum Residential fee shall be \$100 and the minimum Commercial fee shall be \$200.
  - For the purpose of computing this fee, fixtures shall include lavatories, kitchen sinks, slop sinks, water closets, bathtubs, shower stalls, laundry tubs, dishwashers, or other similar devices.
- (b) Special devices.
  - [1] Air Condition Units: \$90 per appliance.
  - [2] Gas piping: \$75 per appliance.
  - [3] Hot water storage tanks: \$90.
  - [4] Grease traps: \$90.
  - [5] Oil separators: \$90.
  - [6] Heating Systems Boiler, steam or water, Hot Air Furnance or similar devices: \$90 \$180.
  - [7] Generators: \$180
  - [8] Hot Water Heater, gas or electric: \$90.
  - [9] Back flow preventer: Residential: \$90.
  - [10] Back flow with test ports: \$100, Commercial.
  - [11] Pool Heaters: \$90.
  - [12] Drains, floor, pool, spa, hot tub, roof, condensate \$40 each.
  - [13] Active Solar System \$100.
  - [14] Stacks: \$75.
  - [15] Propane Tank: \$200.
  - [16] Chimney Liner Inspections 1 and 2 family houses: \$90.
- (c) Sanitary sewer utility, septic connections, utility and ejector pumps, connections or replacement, curb to house, or other similar devices: \$100.
- (d) Water Service
  - [1] Residential: \$100.
  - [2] Commercial
    - [a] Less than two-inch \$100.
    - [b] Two inches or more: \$150.
- (e) Septic Tank Abandonment: \$200.

- (f) Well Abandonment: \$200.
- (g) Annual testing of backflow preventers \$100.
- (h) Minimum Residential plumbing fee shall be \$100., and the minimum commercial fee shall be \$200.
- (3) Electrical subcode fee. The electrical subcode fee shall be determined as follows:
  - (a) Receptacles: \$5.00 per device.
    - [1] Receptacles include, but are not limited to, lighting outlets, wall switches, lighting fixtures, fluorescent fixtures, detectors, light poles, emergency & exit lights, communication points, alarm devices/F.A.C Panel and motors of less than one horsepower (hp) and other similar devices or devices of less than one kilowatt (kw).
  - (b) Motors and Electrical Devices:
    - [1] One horsepower to 10 horsepower: \$100.
    - [2] Greater than 10 horsepower to 50 horsepower: \$150.
    - [3] Greater than 50 horsepower to 100 horsepower: \$250
    - [4] Greater than 100 horsepower: \$450.
  - (c) For each service panel, service entrance, subpanels or similar devices:
    - [1] Less than or equal to 200 amps: \$100.
    - [2] More than 200 amps or equal to 300 amperes: \$300.
    - [3] More than 300 amps through 600 amperes: \$450.
    - [4] More than 600amps through 1200 amperes: \$600.
    - [5] More than 1200 amps \$750.
    - [6] Trenching: \$85.
    - [7] Temporary Service \$100.
  - (d) For transformers and generators **or similar devices**: equipment and appliances, including electrical range oven, dishwasher, dryer, water heater, boiler, furnace, baseboard heat, space heaters, transfer switches or other fixed or plug in appliance each:
    - [1] One kilowatt to up 10 kilowatts \$100.
    - [2] More than 10 kilowatts to 50 kilowatts: \$200.
    - [3] More than 50 kilowatts to 110 kilowatts: \$350.
    - [4] More than 110 kilowatts: \$550.
  - (e) Swimming pools:
    - [1] Pool vault: \$90.
    - [2] Pool bonding \$90.
    - [3] Pool filter motor: \$90.
    - [4] Pool lights (up to 3 units) including controls: \$90; each additional light: \$10.
  - (f) Spa / hot tub (in door): \$90.
  - (g) Spa / hot tub (outdoor): \$90.
  - (h) Certificate of Compliance annual inspection for public pools, spas, hot tubs, \$200 (for each unit).
  - (i) Burglar Alarm System: \$90.
  - (j) Air conditioning units: (disconnects, compress/condensers and air handlers):
    - [1] One ton through six tons, each unit \$90.
    - [2] Greater than six tons through 15 tons each unit: \$120.
    - [3] Replacement of any system part: \$90.

Minimum residential fee: \$100

Minimum commercial fee is \$200.

(4) Fire Protection Subcode Fees:

The fees for the fire protection subcode shall be as follows:

- (a) For gas or oil heating systems installations or conversions in private residences: \$90 in commercial buildings: \$200.
- (b) For gas or oil heating systems installation or conversion in all other structures, per unit: \$90.
- (c) For the installation of any supplemental heating appliance which utilizes solid fuel such as wood or coal: \$90. Any such appliance shall be vented into its own single flue chimney.
- (d) For installation of a fuel storage tank for a residential building: \$90.
- (e) Fuel oil or gasoline storage tanks:
  - [1] For installation of fuel oil gasoline storage tanks in connection with a commercial or business building:
    - [a] Each tank up to 1,000 gallons capacity: \$200.
    - [b] Each tank 1,001 to 3,000 gallons capacity: \$300.
    - [c] Each tank in excess of 3,000 gallons capacity: \$400.
  - [2] When installed with oil burning equipment, the fee for installation of the tank shall include the fee for the installation of the oil burning equipment.
- (f) For installation of fire sprinklers systems, control valves, flow switch and Fire Department Connections, the fee shall be computed on the number of devices to be installed.
  - [1] One to 25 heads: \$150.
  - [2] Twenty-six to 75 heads: \$200.
  - [3] Seventy-six to 100 heads: \$250.

- [4] One hundred one or more heads: \$300.
- [5] Fire Service Main: \$150.
- (g) For fire suppression systems such as dry chemicals, carbon monoxide, halon or foam systems:
  - [1] One to 10 heads or diffusers: \$90.
  - [2] Eleven or more heads or diffusers: \$150.
- (h) Smoke detectors, heat detectors and carbon monoxide detectors.
   [1] For installation of smoke detectors, heat detectors and carbon monoxide detectors: \$10.00 for each detector/device.
- (i) Fire Alarm Control Panel shall be: \$90.
- (j) Kitchen Hood Exhaust System (Commercial): \$200.
- (k) Commercial chimney liner: \$200.
- (I) Installation of fireplaces utilizing gas, per unit: \$90.
- (m) Yard Hydrants: \$200.
- (n) Minimum residential fee: \$100; minimum commercial fee: \$200.
- (5) Miscellaneous:
  - (a) The fee for a construction permit for any item requiring a Uniform Construction Code Permit not specifically addressed shall be as follows unless otherwise specifically set by other subcode or municipal ordinance:
    - [1] Residential: \$100
    - [2] Commercial: \$200.
  - (b) For the reactivation for any permit that has become abandoned the current fees schedule shall apply.
  - (c)Temporary Tents / Party Tents: over 900 square feet or thirty feet of length in one direction:
    - [1] Building Fee: \$100 Residential; \$200 Commercial
    - [2] Electrical Fee: \$100 Residential; \$200 Commercial
    - [3] Plumbing Fee: \$100 Residential; \$200 Commercial
    - [4] Fire Protection Fee: \$100 Residential; \$200 Commercial
  - (d) Change of Contractor Processing / Administrative Fee The fee to apply for a charge of contractor of each, building, plumbing, electrical and fire protection shall be \$90 plus any additional items / cost.
  - (e) Variation: The fee to apply for a building, plumbing, electrical or fire protection variation shall be \$150 per discipline.
- B. Plan review fee. The fee for plan review shall be 20% of the amount to be charged for the construction permit and shall be paid before plans are reviewed. The amount paid for this fee shall be credited toward the amount of the fee charged for the construction permit, but shall not be refundable. The minimum fee shall be \$100 for residential and \$200 for commercial. For the purpose of determining estimated cost, the applicant shall submit to the Building Department, if available, cost date produced by the architect or engineer of record, by a recognized estimating firm or by the contractor. A bona fide contractor's bid may also be submitted if available. The Construction Official shall make the final decision regarding estimated cost.
- C. Demolition fee: The fee for a permit for demolition of:
  - (1) A one- or two-family residence: \$350; commercial buildings: \$450
  - (2) Buildings or structures accessory to a one or two-family dwelling: \$200; commercial fee: \$300.
- **D.** Removal of fuel storage tanks:
  - (1) Residential. The fee for a permit for the removal of a residential fuel storage tank: \$100.
  - (2) Commercial. The fee for a permit for the removal of a nonresidential fuel storage tank:\$200
- E. Certificate of occupancy fees.
  - (1) All new construction: residential and commercial, \$1,000.
  - (2) New construction for additions: residential, \$400; commercial, \$600.
  - (3) Accessory structure: residential, \$100; commercial, \$200.
  - (4) Other. For a certificate of continued occupancy, a certificate of occupancy pursuant to a change in use, multiple certificate of occupancy or similar conditions: residential, \$400; commercial \$600.
  - (5) The initial issuance of a temporary certificate of occupancy shall be free, however, the fee for a renewal of a temporary certificate of occupancy shall be \$30 for all structures, including accessory structures.

#### Section 2

#### Section § 111-13. Fences.

- B. Construction permit.
  - (1) Persons who file an application shall, upon receiving approval from the Alpine Building Department, obtain a construction permit upon the payment to the Construction Official of a fee of:
  - [a] Residential. \$40 per \$1000 of estimated cost of work, provided that the minimum residential fee shall be \$100 and
  - [b] Commercial \$60 per \$1000 of estimated cost of work, provided that the minimum commercial fee shall be \$200.
  - (2) The Building Department, upon completion of construction, shall notify the Assessor so that the information can be recorded on the permanent record card for the particular tract of parcel upon which the fence or retaining wall has been erected.

#### Section 3

#### Section § 177-4B. Sign Permit - Permits and Applications

Permits and Applications. An application with signed permit shall be made by the owner of the premises and the person responsible for the erection of the signing, and both shall be responsible for compliance with this section. The application accompanied by a fee of \$60 per \$1,000 of the estimated cost of work for each permanent sign, provided that the minimum fee is \$200 and \$100 for a temporary sign, shall be made to the Building Inspector and shall contain the following information: [a-d unchanged]

#### Section 4

## Section § 103-8B Driveway Fees

- B. Permit to install, expand, repair, repave or replace existing driveways shall be:
  - (1) Residential \$40 per \$1,000 estimated cost of the work, provided that the minimum fee for residential is \$100
    - (2) Commercial **\$60** per \$1,000 estimated cost of the work, provided that the minimum fee for commercial is \$200

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED** that if any section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by the courts to be invalid, such adjudication shall apply only to the section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision so adjudged, and the remainder of the Ordinance shall be deemed valid and effective.

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED** that this ordinance shall become effective upon final adoption after publication and filing a copy with the Bergen County Planning Board and Department of Community Affairs in accordance with law.

#### Section 1

#### Section § 109-2 Police Services.

- B. Administrative costs. In addition, the party requesting such service shall pay a one-time fee for each project of \$125 to cover the administrative costs associated with the project.
- C. Use of police vehicles. If a party requests a police car or vehicle in conjunction with the services of a police officer or special officer, then the party shall pay the Borough of Alpine a reimbursement rate of \$175 per day for the use of each police vehicle.

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED** that if any section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by the courts to be invalid, such adjudication shall apply only to the section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision so adjudged, and the remainder of the Ordinance shall be deemed valid and effective.

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED** that this ordinance shall become effective upon final adoption after publication. ADOPTED: MARCH 27, 2019

### BOROUGH OF ALPINE ORDINANCE NO. 783 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND

#### CHAPTER 192 ARTICLE III OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF ALPINE, ENTITLED "STREETS AND SIDEWALKS:EXCAVATIONS"

**BE IT ORDAINED**, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Alpine in the County of Bergen and State of New Jersey that Chapter 192 Article III of the Code Of The Borough Of Alpine, Entitled "Streets And Sidewalks: Excavations" be amended as follows:

Delete §192-4 through §192-10 in their entirety and replace with the following:

## 192-4 DEFINITIONS:

#### APPROPRIATE BOROUGH OFFICIAL

Minor street opening: The Superintendent of the Department of Public Works

Major street opening: The Borough Engineer

STREET Any street, road, highway, public way, public alley, easement or other right-of-way accepted or maintained by the Borough as a public thoroughfare as well as any state or county road or highway over which the Borough has acquired jurisdiction by agreement.

MINOR STREET OPENING Any excavation or tunnel which extends less than 30 linear feet and is less than six feet in depth.

MAJOR STREET OPENING Any excavation or tunnel which is not a minor street opening.

<u>TUNNEL Any</u> subsurface excavation performed by augering, directional drilling, pipe-jacking or any similar trenchless construction procedure.

#### 192-5 Permit required

- A. No person shall make an excavation in or tunnel under any street without first obtaining a permit issued by the Superintendent of Public Works following review of the proposed street opening (major or minor) by the appropriate public official.
- B. Emergency Opening. May be commenced without a permit when an emergency has arisen which makes it necessary to commence work immediately; provided, however, that prior to work commencing the application for a permit shall be filed with the Borough Clerk, or in the case of an emergency during nonbusiness hours, the next business day, along with the requisite fees and guarantees as required. In all cases where emergency work is to be performed immediate notice must be made to the Alpine Police Department and the Superintendent of the Department of Public Works prior to work commencing. Issuance of an emergency permit shall be retroactive to the date on which the work was begun.
- C. A road opening permit issued under this section shall be valid for a period of forty-five (45) days which may be extended upon written request to the Superintendent of the Department of Public Works for an additional forty-five (45) days.
- D. The Superintendent of the Department of Public Works may issue permits to other public bodies without a fee.

#### 192-6. Denial of permit: appeal.

The Superintendent of Public Works is authorized to refuse the issuance of any permit, if such refusal is in the interest of public safety, convenience or health. In the event that a permit shall be refused by the Superintendent, an appeal may be taken to the Borough Council. The Council, after hearing the applicant and the Superintendent and other evidence as may be produced, may either direct the issuance of the permit or sustain the refusal of the Superintendent.

#### 192-7. Application for permit

Application for a permit shall be made to the Department of Public Works and shall contain the following information:

- A. Name, address, telephone number and e-mail of the applicant.
- B. Property owner's name, address, telephone number and Borough tax map block and lot number of the property for the benefit of which the opening is to be made
- C. Street in which the opening is to be made and street number, if any, of the abutting property
- D. Nature of the surface in which the opening is to be made
- E. Character and purpose of the work proposed
- F. Dimensions of the opening to be made: depth, length, width
- G. Time when the work is to commenced and completed
- H. Each application must include a drawing or set of plans in duplicate showing the exact location and dimensions of all openings.
- I. Names of the architect and engineer
- J. Name and address of the contractor performing the work
- K. Name, address, and 24/7 telephone number of the party to be reached in the event of an emergency
- L. Name of the street where the opening is to be made and the street number, if any, of the abutting property.
- M. The Borough tax map block and the lot number of the property for the benefit of which the opening is to be made.
- N. Signed acknowledgement that the applicant agrees to replace, at his own cost and expense, the street, curb, gutter, bike path, sidewalk, catch basins, manholes and all other disturbed areas, so as to restore said area to such state and condition as complies with Borough standards, within 90 days of the street opening: provided, however, that within 24 hours of such opening the area shall be temporarily restored by the placement of a stabilized base course, maintained as determined in the reasonable judgment of the appropriate Borough official until the final surface has been laid. The final surface shall not be installed between November 15 and April 15 unless otherwise permitted by a written authorization of the Superintendent of Public Works or the Borough Engineer.
- O. In the case of a proposed road opening that
  - 1) would require sheeting or shoring;
  - 2) could impact the structural stability of the thoroughfare in which the excavation or tunnel is proposed, or any private property or structure(s) adjacent thereto; or
  - 3) could create a situation that may impact the health and safety of the general public and the workers involved in the project served by the road opening,

the Borough Engineer can require fully engineered plans, supporting design calculations, geo-technical investigations and permits from any other governmental agencies having jurisdiction.

Application hereunder shall be filed not less than five business days in advance of any excavation except in case of an emergency opening where the provisions of 192-5B apply.

192-8. Fees

- A. MINOR ROAD OPENING PERMIT: Openings up to thirty (30) feet in length: two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00)
- B. MAJOR ROAD OPENING PERMIT: Openings in excess of thirty feet in length: three hundred dollars (\$300.00), plus fifty (\$0.50) cents per linear foot in excess of thirty(30) feet.
- C. Exception: In the event that a public utility shall be exempted by statute from payment of fees as required by the preceding subsection, the utility company shall nevertheless file with the Borough Clerk annually a surety bond, approved as to form by the Borough Attorney, in the penal sum of not less than \$25,000, conditioned upon the complete restoration of the disturbed surface to such condition as complies with Borough standards.

#### 192-9 Inspection and Engineering Fees

Each applicant for a MAJOR ROAD OPENING PERMIT deposit in trust with the Borough Clerk an amount as determined by the Appropriate Borough Official which is an estimate of all anticipated inspection and engineering costs and fees. In the event that such actual costs and fees are less than the amount deposited in trust, then the Borough shall refund the difference between the amount deposited in trust and the actual costs and fees charged to the applicant. In the event that such actual costs and fees

exceed the amount deposited in trust, then the difference between the actual costs and fees and the amount deposited in trust may be payable from the cash bond required by the terms of 192-8C or by replenishment of the trust account by the applicant.

2. Sections 192-11 through 192-27 unchanged but renumbered to become Sections 192-10 through 192-26.

3. All Ordinances of the Borough of Alpine that are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED** that if any section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by the courts to be invalid, such adjudication shall apply only to the section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision so adjudged, and the remainder of the Ordinance shall be deemed valid and effective.

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED** that this ordinance shall become effective upon final adoption after publication. ADOPTED: MARCH 27, 2019
